Harmful traditional sexual and gender-based practices are universal and prevalent across cultures.

Culturally, Violence Against Women is those acts that are explicitly justified or condoned through misuse of cultural, religious, or traditional beliefs, values, and practices that are meant to impose patriarchal control over women and girls. There are, for example, Early Child Marriage, Female Genital Mutilations (FGM), and limitations of Women's development and advancement due to customs and traditional beliefs. Many of these culturally sanctioned practices are meant to subjugate women.

African Queens & Cultural Leaders Network, The African Royal Kingdoms (The ARK), and African Views Organization (AQWCLN– The ARK - AV) are the organizers of the African cultural leaders' conference on ending harmful traditional sexual and gender-based practices in observance of the Commission on the Status of Women (CSW 65) 2021, scheduled to take place on April 28^{th, 2021} at 2 PM Ghana Time.

Topics of discussion will include ensuring the following

- Role of Women in High-level Decision-Making leadership positions (if women can be president and prime ministers, why can't the queen rule in kingdoms)
- Removing traditional impediments of women repression such as Early child marriages,
- Zero Tolerance Female Genital mutilations, breast pressing, inheritance rights, and other harmful practices.
- Reimagining the role, choice, and potential of Women's contribution in modern traditional societies

Traditional rulers representing all the Six African regions will discuss eradicating harmful traditional practices in the communities.

Development Queen-mother of Afigya-Kwabre Community in Ashanti

Nana Adwoa Awindor is the Development Queen mother of Afigya-Kwabre district in the Ashanti Region of Ghana. In 2013, she was elected the First President of the Continental Executive Board of the African Queens and Women Cultural Leaders Network. She is a member of the Unity and Advocacy Queens Ghana (AQWCLN Ghana)

Nana Adwoa Awindor is the host of the award-winning TV show titled Greetings from Abroad/Back Home Again and the CEO of a Premier Productions company. She holds several other traditional titles and a prominent figure among Ghana cultural elites.

As the Executive Director of OBAAPA Development Foundation (ODF), Nanahemaa Awindor has coordinated various Projects and Programs. For the past 5 years ODF have partnered with overt 20 Traditional Councils across Ghana to run the OBAAPA Women's Day Celebration Program at Ghanaian Festivals. ODF's Flagship project, the Teenage Mothers Back To School Project (TMBTSP) has enrolled 70 young mother drop-outs back to the classroom. The project aims to enroll up to 1000 Teenage mothers Back to School within the next 10 years.








THE KINGDOM OF IDO OSUN

Prime among his duties as King is a passionate vision to empower women and see that the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals is achieved by 2030 in Africa. It was his vision that shaped the COTLA/CONATA as the main platform where Traditional and Cultural Leaders can more constructively engage and contribute at AU and the UN, regional, national and local levels to move towards the attainment of Africa's development, human rights and respect for girls' and women's rights with progressive cultural values.

She is an icon who is highly regarded in society for her leadership and is renowned as a champion for mobilizing, sensitizing and empowering girls and boys including children with disabilities, the youth, and women, and for advancing Obuntubulamu as a strategic approach in all Foundation programmes and projects, that empowers individuals to reclaim their cultural heritage and encourages the use of cultural values as a tool for human development.








TINTO MBU COMMUNITY

RAIN QUEEN VII MASALANABO II

(Modjadji of Balobedu)

The name Modjadji or Rain Queen refers to a line of queens of the Balobedu (Limpopo province, South Africa) known for their ability to control clouds and rainfall. The girl child that was the result of this union became the first in a long line of Lovedu Rain Queens, known by the ceremonial name of Mudjadji (or Modjadji), which literally means 'ruler-of-the-day'.

The Lobedu or Balobedu (also known as the BaLodzwi or Bathobolo) are a southern African ethnic group within the Sotho-Tswana people group. They were initially known as Bakwebo (wild pigs). The name "bolobedu" means place of tribute, go loba/lobela. Hence Balobedu are people who receive tribute from others. They have their own kingdom, the Balobedu Kingdom, within the Limpopo Province of South Africa with a female ruler, the Rain Queen Modjadji.
